

Moving up the trade facilitation ladder towards seamless international supply chains

The level of implementation of trade facilitation measures in Libya (9.7%) is well below the level in West Asia (48.4%). Among the five core groups of trade facilitation measures, the most implemented in Libya are “Transparency” measures (60%). However, no measure belonging to the other four groups has been implemented. In contrast, “Transit” measures are adequately implemented (66.7%).

Implementation of “Transparency” measures is partial. Particularly, *advance ruling* and *advance publication of regulation before implementation* have not been put in place yet. Analogously, “Formalities”, “Paperless trade”, “Cross-border paperless trade” and “Institutional arrangement and cooperation” measures have not been implemented.

Libya may focus its trade facilitation efforts in particular on full implementation of “Institutional arrangement” measures, as well as on developing adequate “formalities” to move up along the trade facilitation ladder. In the long run, Libya may then focus on more complex measures such as “Paperless trade” and “Cross-border paperless trade”.
